#### Mexico High School Discipline Guidelines

Level 1: Lower Level

#### Teachers' Classroom Managed Behaviors

#### Minor Disruptive behavior:

Sleeping (exception: signs of drug use)
Making noises in class
Talking in class
Off task, will not work
Moving around the room - restless
Not bringing materials
Off-task behavior
Public display of affection (minor)
Ordinary student conversational
profanity (Ruby Payne)
Impulsiveness – example: walking
around without permission, etc.

#### **Minor Defiance:**

Refusing to follow reasonable directions for simple tasks



- Student given the opportunity to self-correct and a WARNING for minor disruptive behavior.
- Teacher has had a conference with student individually. (hallway, before or after school)
- 3. After step 1 and 2: Teacher assignment to Behavior Intervention Program for the remainder of the hour (Pink Slip). Teacher reports this assignment to the case manager if the student has an IEP. Teacher sends student with BIP (pink) pass, notifies office and/or BIP instructor via phone or intercom and fills out the google form. Teacher notifies parent via phone or EMAIL and logs this contact in SISK12 sends all appropriate course work with the student to the behavior intervention program.
- 4. The behavior continues and teacher has made contact with student's parent about behavior.

Write a referral in SISK12 then meet with the appropriate administrator; document 1, 2, 3 and 4 and submit referral (SISK12)

#### Level 2: Upper Level – administrator involvement

#### **Administrator Managed Behaviors**

Any school safety and security related issue (ex. rumors of violence)
Fighting/Assault/Threats

Bullying

Gang-related behavior

Arson

Sexual assault or major P.D.A.

Examples: groping, under clothing, touching personal areas, and/or unsolicited touching

#### Physical and non-physical harassment

Includes use of cell phones and computers to send inappropriate threats, pictures, sounds or other material

Threats of Violence - Written and spoken

Drugs/Alcohol

**Disrespect** – Verbal, written, pictorial or symbolic language or gesture that is directed at any person (including student or staff) that is in violation of district policy or is otherwise rude, vulgar, defiant, considered inappropriate in educational settings or that materially and substantially disrupts classroom work, school activities or school functions. Students will not be disciplined for speech in situations where it is protected by law.

#### <u>OR</u>


Any <u>persistent disruption</u> to your classroom learning environment after steps 1, 2 and 3 have been followed for <u>teacher managed</u> (see left box) behavior.

#### Notify a Principal and/or School Resource Officer IMMEDIATELY

Write a Complete Referral in SISK12, send student to office with yellow pass – call office via intercom

All students involved in persistent on-going disruption, fights/assault, severe disrespect and drug-related offenses will be assigned the MAXIMUM consequences allowed by school policy by the MHS principal. In addition, persistent behavioral issues by students will be assessed by an administrator and could warrant a recommendation of up to 180 days out of school suspension with superintendent approval.


