Overview of Check & Connect	 Articulate the four core components of Check & Connect and explain how Check & Connect mentors use them in implementation Understand and be mindful of the theoretical underpinnings of Check & Connect in their work as a Check & Connect mentor Present a 30-second overview description of Check & Connect
Role of the mentor	 Explain the purpose and role of the mentor in Check & Connect Identify personal and professional characteristics of an effective mentor Articulate the main functions of a Check & Connect mentor, providing specific examples Make a long-term commitment to students and persist despite challenges Keep the focus on education and learning
Resilience	 Identify protective factors and risk factors in Check & Connect mentees' home, school, and community environments Understand and explain the role of the Check & Connect mentor in reducing risks and enhancing protective factors for students who face adversity
Student engagement	 Verbalize the importance of student engagement in the context of their role as a Check & Connect mentor Understand the role of student engagement in the larger context of dropout prevention Identify and provide specific examples for each of the four sub-types of engagement Articulate the importance of person-environment fit and provide examples of strategies to improve it for their mentee(s)
Building relationships	 Establish a plan for introducing himself/herself to the mentee(s) Identify characteristics of an effective mentor-mentee relationship in the context of child development and individual and cultural differences Understand that building relationships is a process which follows a natural cycle; learn how to use the natural cycle of relationships within Check & Connect Create and use a plan for initiating and maintaining communication

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	 with administrators, teachers, and others that are involved internally with their mentee(s) Understand the importance of building on the strengths of the student and family
Problem-solving and capacity building strategies	 Articulate the importance of using problem-solving and capacity building strategies with students Identify and demonstrate the use of the 5-step problem-solving process Facilitate goal setting, both short-term and long-term goals
Case management	 Differentiate between status and alterable indicators of disengagement Identify sources of data that are monitored to determine student engagement Identify how student data is typically accessed Articulate the typical intake process Demonstrate the ability to document and assess multiple data points on a monitoring sheet/data-based system Articulate common criteria for student selection for Check & Connect Identify appropriate information for case notes
Data-driven intervention	 Articulate the difference between a basic and intensive level of intervention Understand common criteria for moving from basic to intensive intervention levels Demonstrate how to access and identify potential interventions based on student data Explain the process they will use to monitor the impact of intensive interventions
Engaging parents and families	 Identify a plan for introducing himself/herself to the mentees' parents/family Articulate the importance of engaging parents/families in student engagement efforts
Personal motivation and persistence	 Articulate the need for a focus on intrinsic motivation: promoting autonomy, belonging, and competence Identify strategies for assissting students to take responsibility for their own motivation and persistence
