Scenarios



ABC



During a group STEM activity, two members of the group are not getting along. Each one is stating that the other's ideas are "stupid" and "will never work". The other members continue to work hard and make progress.

The multi-year PBIS exemplar school's principal (who was a cheerleader for all things PBIS) has retired. The new principal in the building is against PBIS. The new principal requires all the staff members to read the book "Punished By Rewards" and wants to implement a strike system. This movement has been encouraged by a few PBIS resisters in the building. The faculty and staff feels helpless in combating the new principal's decisions about PBIS.

Students are given an assignment that requires them to work independently at their desks. After 10 minutes, Cindy leaves her seat and begins walking around the room, sometimes stopping to talk to other students. Even after repeated teacher re-directions, Cindy verbally complies, but continues to walk and

A third grade teacher pulls a group of kids in the hallway to loudly berate them and have a "Come-To-Jesus-Meeting." The teacher thinks she's being strict, tough and has control, but the kids are miserable and the other teachers on the team are frustrated with the lack of positive, effective consequences. A parent has called the principal and has complained.

Martin has not been working on his assignment. When you redirect him, he pushes away the assignment, looks you in the eye, and directly says, "This is B_______S___!"

The data indicates that the staff may need more professional development on functional behavioral assessments and function-based interventions, but with the implementation of the Missouri Learning Standards and writing new curriculum, there is little time left for other professional development.
