DR. HEATHER L. HATTON is an assistant research professor in the Department of Special Education at the University of Missouri. Her areas of expertise include positive behavior interventions and supports, meta-analytic techniques for single-case research, evidence-based practice in special education, and models for pre-service and in-service training.



DR. KELSEY MORRIS is an assistant teaching professor in the College of Education at the University of Missouri. At the MU Center for SW-PBS, Morris works with district-level teams on the implementation of multi-tiered systems of support. His areas of focus are classroom management, SW-PBS and data-based decision-making.



Ignite sessions: Ignite sessions are five-minute presentations consisting of 20 slides each that advance every 15 seconds – providing just enough information to spark interest in the audience. Networking time will be available after the sessions for audience members to meet with the presenters and receive further information on the topics.

RDQs: Roundtable discussion and question sessions (RDQs) are open-ended and designed to create dialogue and networking among like-minded stakeholder groups. This year's RDQs are organized by the following stakeholders: secondary and alternative schools, elementary and early childhood, urban districts and schools, and the Missouri Model Districts-Behavior (MMD-B) Pilot.

Poster sessions: Poster sessions provide a fun and informal opportunity to see what others have done and learned while implementing SW-PBS and to generate discussion on how SW-PBS is actually working. TIER 1 2 3 SCHOOLWIDE

1A: Maintenance Level – This Does Not Mean the Work Is Done (Parasol II)

Bush Elementary School is a K-5 gold-status building. While at the maintenance level, our SW-PBS became a bit stagnant. So, we decided to talk to teachers, teams and students to restructure and revamp our system. By shaking things up and giving students more of a voice, needs are being met and our teams are running more efficiently. At the district level, we developed a team to ensure fidelity of practices and the sustainability of the program across the district.

BUSH ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – FULTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

Bush Elementary School currently serves more than 350 students and is in the Heart of Missouri region. Bush Elementary strives to engage staff, students and families in planning and providing Tier 1, 2 and 3 supports as needed. This work has resulted in decreased office-discipline referrals and increased academic instructional time. Bush Elementary is currently implementing SW-PBS at the Maintenance level.



A.D. STOWELL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – HANNIBAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

A.D. Stowell Elementary School currently serves over 250 students and is in the Northeast region. Students are excited about school and take ownership for their learning and success. The culture of the school also has improved. Students are more caring and respectful, and they are willing to help others and become leaders. A.D. Stowell Elementary is currently implementing SW-PBS at the Tier 3 level.



WILLIAM CHRISMAN HIGH SCHOOL - INDEPENDENCE SCHOOL DISTRICT

William Chrisman High School currently serves more than 1,340 students and is located in the Kansas City region. There are many innovative implementation activities at William Chrisman High including staff receiving ongoing professional development on the Eight Effective Classroom Practices and a student-run pop-up shop that allows students to redeem their BEAR cards for meeting positive schoolwide expectations. William Chrisman High is currently implementing SW-PBS at the Tier 2 Advanced level.



RAVENWOOD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL – NORTH KANSAS CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT

Ravenwood Elementary School currently serves over 380 students and is in the Kansas City region. SW-PBS is changing the way students and teachers are thinking of the school's culture and climate. Ravenwood Elementary focuses not only on recognizing individual students but also on having a positive environment throughout the building. Ravenwood Elementary is currently implementing SW-PBS at the Maintenance level.



REEDS SPRING PRIMARY SCHOOL - REEDS SPRING R-IV SCHOOL DISTRICT

Reeds Spring Primary School currently serves more than 210 students and is in the Agency for Teaching, Leading and Learning/Springfield region. The school works to conduct collaborative teaming where the well-being of all students is reviewed. Staff members continually strive to improve student outcomes and recently used data to identify ways to improve bus behavior. Reeds Spring Primary is currently implementing SW-PBS at the Tier 3 Advanced level.

RICHLAND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL - RICHLAND R-IV SCHOOL DISTRICT

Richland Elementary School currently serves over 290 students and is located in the South Central region. The school works to conduct monthly leadership meetings where data-based decisions support the use of a behavioral flowchart and teacher guidelines to implement supports that improve student outcomes. Richland Elementary is currently implementing SW-PBS at the Tier 3 level.

Meet the Dr. Mary Richter District of Distinction Award Nominees

FULTON SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Fulton School District serves more than 2,300 students and is located in the Heart of Missouri region. Since implementing SW-PBS districtwide in 2011, Fulton has noticed multiple changes throughout its schools. The four-year graduation rate has risen from 70 percent to 88 percent, and the five-year graduation rate has gone from 73 percent to 94 percent. The dropout rate has fallen from 8.8 percent to 3.3 percent since implementing SW-PBS districtwide. Fulton also has experienced consistency throughout its buildings. Students who move from school to school have an advantage in already knowing the expectations and can focus on academics rather than spending a large amount of time relearning expectations. Districtwide implementation of SW-PBS is producing positive outcomes for Fulton students due to increased district, school and team collaboration focusing on high-quality classroom instruction.



INDEPENDENCE SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Independence School District currently serves over 15,800 students and is located in the Kansas City region. With 29 schools in different stages of training and implementation, the district embraces its indicators of success as well as its areas of challenge. Independence utilizes a district leadership-team structure to implement data-based decision-making and has seen its six-year SW-PBS commitment result in accelerating payoffs. At the leadership level (which was the priority for embedding and sustaining an SW-PBS culture districtwide), a strategic approach is being deployed to increase internal capacity. Independence's success is reflected in growing 90/90 attendance (+5.8 percent) and the four-year graduation rate (+17.6 percent). Independence also has reduced the dropout rate (a reduction of 4.7 percent), which was significantly above the state average in 2013 but was significantly below the state average within the last year.



Mary Miller Richter, Ph.D., was the first state director of Missouri Schoolwide Positive Behavior Support (MO SW-PBS) serving from 2006 until her death in 2014. She was a lifelong learner, a consummate professional and a respected leader in the field of education. Mary was passionate about grounding the work of MO SW-PBS in research while simultaneously working to build systems for statewide support that would serve as a national exemplar. Her dream is now a reality. Her legacy has improved life outcomes for countless students across the state of Missouri and beyond.

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

Anchor and Beacon Building Meeting and Facilities Directional Map




Windgate Hall: Located on the 5th floor of Anchor Building. From the Paradise Ballroom Foyer on the 6th floor, either take the parking garage elevator or the stairs down one floor to Windgate Hall.

Beacon Building Meeting Rooms

Having trouble with stairs?

Take the connecting corridor from Anchor Building to Beacon Building: From Anchor Building, go to the double elevators where the guest rooms are located. Ride to level 4. Go through the guest room hallway, exiting at the far end. Turn left and follow the hallway to Beacon Building. Compass Rose Ballroom: On the 7th floor of Anchor Building (floor above the Main Lobby) go down the Boardwalk, past all of the shops, down three flights of stairs to the Beacon Building Landing. At the Landing, take the short flight of carpeted stairs going up. The Compass Rose Ballroom is on the left.

Coral Reef: On the 7th floor of Anchor Building (floor above the Main Lobby) go down the Boardwalk, past Wood'n Ya Wanit. Coral Reef is on the left before Lindee's.
